## In Warren, the \$151.9-million question is:

WARREN

**"Stinker!"**  
That's how Mary Stebbins views the winner of Wednesday's \$151.9-million Powerball jackpot. Well, on second thought, she said, "Good for them. I'm very happy. We've never had anybody from here actually win it all."  
Stebbins and her co-workers waiting tables at The Restaurant & Café in Warren yesterday morning were among the many here buzzing about just who might have bought the winning Powerball ticket at Warren Mart, just over a mile from Main Street.  
Everyone, it seemed, had ideas on how they would spend the bounty, and most had advice for the winner: stay true, invest wisely and get a good lawyer.

Wednesday's Powerball jackpot is the state's first in six years — a Pawtucket man won \$93.5 million in 2001 — and the largest prize in Rhode Island lottery history. The winner's numbers, on a quickpick ticket — 8, 23, 32, 37, 39 — matched the five white balls drawn at 10:59 p.m., and the ticket's final number, 38, matched the red Powerball.  
Now if only we knew who won!  
By yesterday afternoon, state lottery officials still had not heard from the winner. Officials are advising the ticket-holder to sign the ticket, put it in safe place, "seek sound financial and legal advice" — and get in touch.

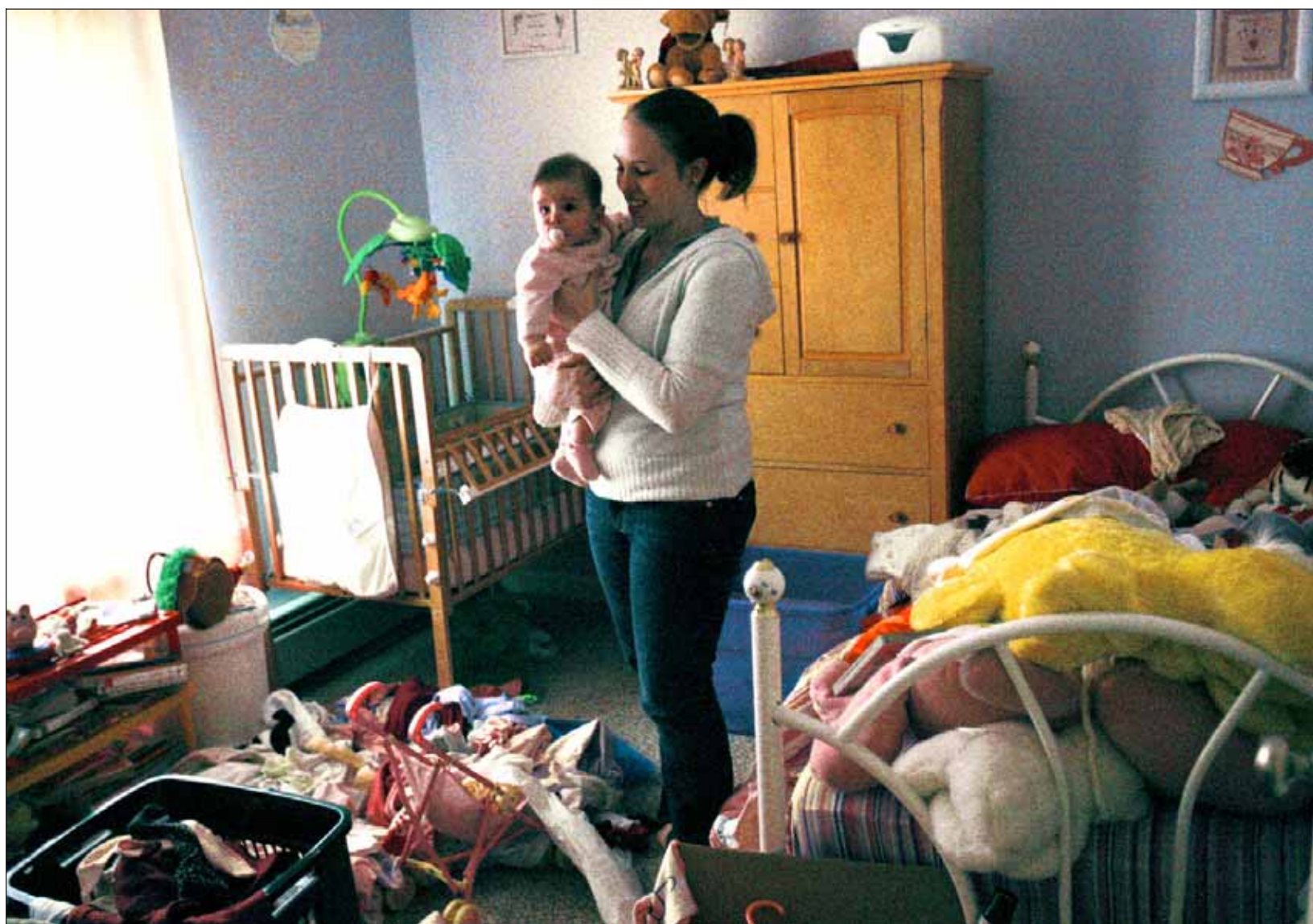

## Putting roofs within reach

A year ago, voters approved a \$50-million bond for more affordable housing. Some units are now becoming available.

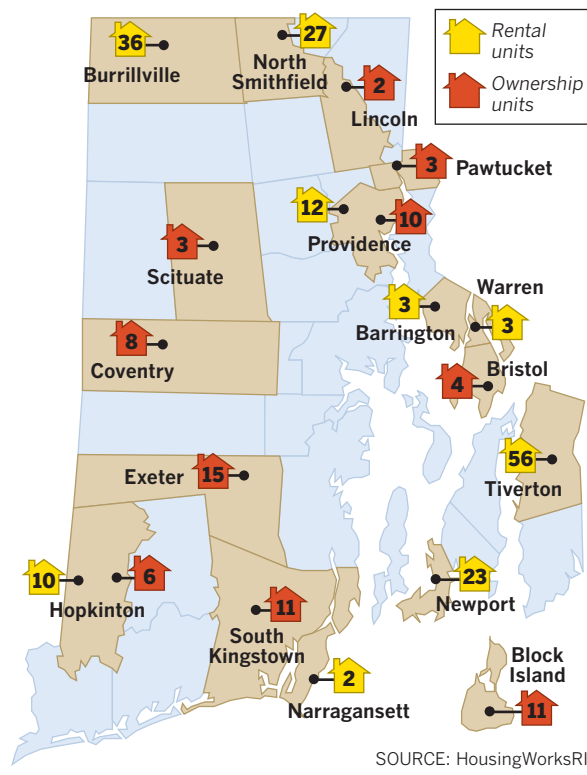
**BURRILLVILLE** — The Stillwater Mill has been idle for more than 30 years, but housing advocates and local officials yesterday pointed to it as a symbol of what is coming.  
Over the next two years, the brick and concrete mill that once made Army uniforms will be converted into 47 apartments — all but 11 available at below-market rents of \$450 to \$750 a month.  
Helping to make the project possible is a \$1.2-million grant from the state's Building Homes Rhode Island program, a venture that was

celebrated yesterday as officials marked one year since state voters overwhelmingly approved a \$50-million housing bond.  
"We are just beginning to see the results of this investment," said Susan Baxter, chairwoman of the state Housing Resources Commission, which distributed \$10 million in grants to developers in July. "In the coming year, we expect to create 200 units of housing."  
In fact, advocates say the \$10-million installment will help to create 245 income-restricted, afford-

## Training School project too small

The \$61-million facility due to open in April will be too small for the number of youths already in state custody.

The state will spend more than \$60 million on a new Training School that will open in the spring. Taxpayers will be paying off the related debt for the next 18 years.  
But there are indications that the facility may be overcrowded the day it opens.  
The new juvenile detention center — which is really two separate buildings on the Pastore Complex in Cranston — will be ready for occupancy in April, Patricia Martinez, director of the Department of Children, Youth and Families, said yesterday.  
Overall, the new buildings are designed to hold 148 children. Yesterday, there were 176 youths locked up in the old facility, which must be replaced because of a 1979 court order and subsequent decree that cited the Training School for

## Musharraf to lift state of emergency

Responding to demands at home and abroad, the Pakistani president says he will return the country to democracy and hold "free and fair" elections.

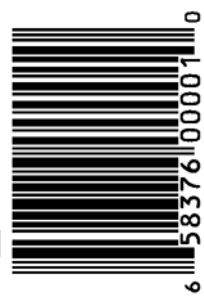

**ISLAMABAD, Pakistan** — Hours after being sworn in to a second term, President Pervez Musharraf announced yesterday that he would lift his state of emergency on Dec. 16, leaving barely three weeks for election campaigning and setting the stage for further confrontation with his opposition.  
Musharraf's promise to lift the emergency came after he ended eight years of military rule on Wednesday and was another step toward meeting some of the most urgent demands both at home and abroad to return the country to democracy.  
"I fully intend to lift the emergency on Dec. 16, to end the Provisional Constitutional Order and to hold fair and free elections according to the Consti-
