## Teenager indicted in boating death

Ryan Greenberg, 17, faces a second-degree murder charge in connection with the death of his former Barrington High School classmate, Patrick Murphy.

BARRINGTON — Ryan Greenberg will now face a charge of second-degree murder in connection with the July 17 boating death of Patrick Murphy after a state-wide grand jury handed up an indictment of the 17-year-old yesterday.

Greenberg, now a senior at Hope High School in Providence but previously Murphy's classmate at Barrington High School, had been charged with one felony count of operating a boat to endanger, death resulting; one misdemeanor count of underage possession of alcohol; and one misdemeanor count of refusing to take a breath test after he was pulled off the Barrington River and failed a field sobriety test.

The grand jury affirmed those earlier charges as well. Greenberg, of 33 Lamson Rd., will be arraigned on

## Corruption convictions appealed

Two former executives of Roger Williams Medical Center say the judge gave faulty instructions to the jury.

BOSTON — The former president of Roger Williams Medical Center, and another ex-hospital executive facing federal jail time for corruption, argued in appeals court yesterday to overturn their convictions for paying a state senator to advance the hospital's agenda.

Lawyers for Robert A. Urciuoli, the former president and chief executive officer of Roger Williams, and Frances P. Driscoll, a former senior vice president, told a three-judge panel of the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals that the jury that convicted the executives had received faulty instructions from the judge, which may have created an impression that

## Frustrated judge poised to jail man over non-payment

PROVIDENCE — Unless the state Supreme Court steps in today, a Barrington man will go to prison tomorrow because he failed to make court-ordered payments over the past two months to the Warwick man whose skull he fractured in a 1988 brawl.

Since a 1992 civil judgment, Paul D. Grieder has paid about \$21,000 toward the \$1.5 million he owes Michael P. Trainor for an assault outside a Providence nightclub. With interest, the debt now totals nearly \$5 million.

On Oct. 4, Superior Court Judge Daniel A. Procaccini said he'd send Grieder to the Adult Correctional Institutions for 30 days if he failed to pay \$3,000 to Trainor and \$1,000 to Trainor's lawyer within 60 days.

Grieder has not made any payments since then, his
