BOSTON — It was slated as a pitchers' duel. It was a pitchers' duel.

The Sox' Josh Beckett and the Diamondbacks' Dan Haren painted masterpieces. The pair of right-handers entered last night's interleague game at Fenway with matching 7-4 records. Haren was slightly better in the ERA department with a 3.26 compared to Beckett's 3.87.

The clash was everything it was hyped up to be — and then some.

In the end, however, it was Haren who was a little bit better as Arizona barely defeated Boston, 2-1. Haren dominated and finished seven solid scoreless innings and allowed just two hits with one

Mediate tunes out static amid spotlight of Open

BARRINGTON — Johnny Miller was right.

"Guys with the name Rocco don't get on the trophy, do they?" Miller — whose name is on the trophy — said during the telecast of the U.S. Open. Nope, they don't.

Not yet, anyway. The thriller at Torrey Pines in which Tiger Woods, the world's greatest player, needed 91 holes to edge popular underdog Rocco Mediate, was the 108th U.S. Open championship, and not one of them has been won by a guy named Rocco.

The most common name on the list of winners is Willie, which appears six times (Willie Smith, Willie MacFarlane, and Willie Anderson, who won four Opens.) That's one more time than Jack (Nicklaus, a four-time winner; and, in an upset that

was bigger than Mediate's would have been, Jack Fleck, who beat Ben Hogan in a playoff at the Olympic Club in San Francisco in 1955.) Bantam Ben did, however, win four other times.

There's been a Cary (twice) and a Gary. There's been a Lloyd and a Lawson. There's been an Orville — but no Wilbur — and an Olin. There's been a Horace, a Hubert, and three times, a Hale. Twice, there has been a Ralph, and a Retief, too. Count two Ernies, two Curtises, and two Paynes. Three times, an Alex — as well as a Bobby — have won. Two Toms have won the Open, as well as two Tommys and two Tonys (Jacklin, in 1970, and Manero, in 1936.) There's been a Jerome, an Angel, a Cyril, a Julius, and an Arnold. And, now, three Tigers. Or is it Eldricks?

At any rate, no Rocco. Unfortunately. Because a lot of people

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Younger Andrade's tips guide Watson-Villegas

BARRINGTON — There is a very good chance an Andrade will win the CVS Caremark Charity Classic today. The question is, which one?

Billy Andrade, the tourney co-host with Brad Faxon, put himself in excellent position when he combined with his partner, Davis Love III, for a 9-under-par 62 in yesterday's opening round.

Only one team did better. Two of the PGA Tour's brightest young stars, Bubba Watson and Camilo Villegas, put together a 10-under 61 to take the lead heading into today's final round of the \$1.5-million event at Rhode Island Country Club. Those two were relaxed as they spoke afterward about how much they enjoy taking part in the CVS.

One member of their team, though, was all business. He talked about how badly he wants to win, especially how he wants to beat the Andrade-Love team.

"I want to beat my dad," said 14-year-old Cameron Andrade.

"He's always talking trash." The younger Andrade, all 5 feet and 78 pounds of him, is caddying for Watson. He and Watson formed a friendship two years ago when Watson played in the CVS. When they met in April at the Masters, Watson asked if Cameron could caddie for him when he returned to RICC.

Cameron Andrade all but stole the show yesterday. Watson provided a smaller bag than the usual large bag PGA Tour players use, but even that sometimes seemed
